Yusof: Portrait of a President

Director's message

Let us delve into the life of Yusof bin Ishak, the first president of Singapore.

Yusof bin Ishak was a remarkable individual deeply attuned to his environment. He aspired to be the best not only for himself, but for his entire community. He recognised the urgent need to elevate the standard of the Malays.

The establishment of Utusan Melayu was his means of championing his people, empowering them through access to news information. He understood that knowledge fosters self-understanding and a deeper comprehension of the world. With knowledge, they could engage in critical thinking and make informed decisions. Furthermore, knowledge plays a crucial role in advocating for social change, enabling them to overcome obstacles, innovate and contribute to societal betterment. This was the essence of Yusof Ishak's mission, executed in a humble manner. He travelled from village to village to persuade them of the importance of Utusan Melayu and sacrificed his own electricity when his neighbours had none, so that he could be equal with them. Even after becoming the head of state, he chose to reside in a smaller house called Melati House, previously used by the part-time workers of the Istana.

As human beings, we possess distinct values and principles that define our individuality. These values serve as guidelines in our lives,

influencing our actions and decisions. They are shaped by both external factors, such as family, culture, peers, education, and religion, and internal processes, including personal experiences, reflection and independent thought. These influences, particularly during childhood, establish a foundational moral compass. However, they are dynamic and can be refined or altered over time through new experiences and conscious self-evaluation.

By sharing the life of Yusof Ishak and the individuals who shaped him, we are inspired and informed of our own identity and potential. In the face of a precarious world characterised by heightened political, economic, environmental and social challenges, it is with great responsibility that we uphold our values and strive to create a beautiful and peaceful society.

I conclude with a line by Yusof from the play:

"I realise now that if we set aside our principles and ethics, we will begin to lose our integrity. Without integrity, we are only a hollowed shell, empty, rootless and useless. That is the important lesson that I must teach my family and my children."

ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT – ZIZI AZAH BINTE ABDUL MAJID

Zizi Majid is a playwright whose plays advocate for a shared humanity. Recipient of the 2025 New York State Council for the Arts/New York Foundation for the Arts Artist Fellowship as well as a Playwriting Fellowship with the Dramatists Guild Foundation, her work has been developed at the Lucille Lortel Theatre (NYC), Syracuse Stage (Syracuse) and WP Theatre (NYC). She won the Pacific Rim Prize for Playwriting (Kumu Kahua Theatre/University of Hawaii Manoa); and has been named alternate for the Princeton Arts Fellowship, a finalist for the Blue Ink Playwriting Award; a thrice semi-finalist for the O'Neil National Playwrights Conference and a finalist for the Columbia@Roundabout New Play Reading Series. Plays include On the Vessel (formerly titled Milk), They Came in the Night, Return to Fall, Yusof and How Did the Cat Get So Fat.

Zizi was formerly the artistic director of Teater Ekamatra (Singapore) garnering multiple awards during her tenure. Zizi received her MFA in Playwriting from Columbia University and lives in Central New York where she teaches at Syracuse University and Hamilton College.

ABOUT TEATER EKAMATRA


Teater Ekamatra is a Singaporean arts company that creates daring works about important social and political issues.

- 3. What challenges did Yusof Ishak face personally and publicly?


Discussion Prompts


